### VOLUNTARY NON-PROFIT CORPORATION FORMED

On May 19, 1968, at Augusta, an initiatory meeting of interested people agreed to establish a voluntary non-profit corporation under the Laws of Maine, to be known as the Arnold Expedition Historical Society, with the general purpose of conducting research, exploration, and publication concerned with the expedition and related matters. A charter committee was named, and pro-tem officers were elected.

On June 23, 1968, at the organization meeting in Augusta, the charter and by-laws were discussed, amended, and adopted. Officers were elected: White Nichols, Wiscasset, President; Robert A.

Cunningham, Lincoln, Mass., Vice-President; Harold E. Brown, Bath, Treasurer; F. G. Fassett, Jr., Newcastle, Secretary; and fifteen Directors, as provided by the charter, were elected: for three years, Charles Peirce, Palermo; Waldeck E. Mainville, Jr., Cape Elizabeth; Cecil Pierce, West Southport; Dana Nye, Belgrade; Duluth Wing, Eustis; for two years, White Nichols; Robert A.

Cunningham; Albert West, Boston and Pittston; Charles Bradford, Manchester; Arthur Griffith. Monmouth; for one year, Francis Finnegan, Augusta; Mrs. Barbara Johnson, Hampden; Mrs. Edward Giddings, Orono; Mrs. Robert Kellogg, Bangor; and Miss Marguerite Kelley, Waterville.

# ARNOLD MARCH BOOKLET PUBLISHED

A 20-page magazine size booklet, containing reproductions of the historic markers erected by the Parks and Recreation Commission along the Kennebec and Dead river routes, is now available for sale to members at \$1.00 and to others in stores at \$1.50. The project was made possible by Arthur Griffiths and the artist S. W. Hilton, who painted the signs for the park commission. Titled "Arnold's March to Quebec, An Account in Pictures," the booklet contains excerpts from the journals of Arnold, his officers and men, maps and scenes of hardships along the route. Full page pictures in the booklet show the picking up of the pilot off Popham Beach at Phippsburg, scenes of the portagese, the falls at Skowhegan, the start of the Carry from the Kennebec to the Dead River below Carratunk, the late autumn hurricane that contributed to the hardships of the expedition and the wounding of Arnold on the Plains of Abraham outside the citadel at Quebec.

Mr. Hilton is presently designing a suitable emblem for the Society. The emblem will be incorporated in the membership cards that will soon be available and in the Society's stationery.

# TWO DAY MEETING PLANNED IN JULY

The Society's next meeting is planned for July 27-28 at the Evergreens, Solon, Maine, a site where the Expedition camped, as had generations of Abenakis before it.
