REPORT ON SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING

The semi-annual meeting of A.E.H.S. held March 5th at the Clarissa Illsley Tavern in Damariscotta was well attended and the guest speakers held their audience's attention with keen interest.

Paul Rivard, Director of the Maine State Museum, detailed the operation and future plans for the museum, and expressed an interest in assisting the small historical societies throughout the State when the priorities of permanent exhibits at the museum are carried out.

Earle "Bud" Warren of the Bath Iron Works recounted early ships, shipping and shipbuilding on the Maine coast and on the Kennebec River. His stories of incidents in the operation of Maine-built ships as a result of the difficult navigation on the unchartered coast in the early 1600's, together with the names of the ships and captains, displayed his extensive research on the subject.

By the way, the Bath Marine Museum with which Warren in associated is a focal point for history buffs on the subject of Maine's Maritime Heritage and shipbuilding from 1607. From 1870 to 1890 more than half the wooden sailing vessels built in the United States were Maine built and not only did Maine men build them but they sailed them to all corners of the world.

MAP/BROCHURE "KENNEBEC RIVER GUIDE"

The Kennebec River Corridor Group, composed of representatives from the Southern Kennebec Valley Regional Planning Commission, Bath and Augusta Chambers of Commerce and members of historical societies and other interested parties, has met from time to time with a view towards producing and distributing an historical and promotional map/brochure of the Kennebec River Corridor. A Steering Committee was appointed to consolidate and summarize the ideas of the interested parties. After several meetings of the Steering Committee, a general meeting of the full group was held on May 10th at the Dresden Inn, and the results of

their deliberations presented along with a mock-up of the proposed format and design of the proposed map/brochure. With a few suggested changes and corrections, on approval of those present the project was turned over to Bruce Taylor, consultant, for finalizing the format, production, selling of advertising, arranging for printing and distribution. Mr. Taylor will take full financial risk (profit or loss) for the production of the brochure at no cost to the participating group. He will set the charges for advertising space and will have sole income from the advertising to cover his costs of production, printing and distribution, plus a profit for his services for the first year. If the venture proves profitable, the brochure in the future may be expanded and put under the supervision of the Kennebec Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The Guide, a folding map/brochure, will be distributed to information centers in Southern Maine. Historical sites which are open to the public and boat landings will be shown on the map which features the Kennebec south from Augusta to Popham.

CETA APPLICATION

In order to progress our long-range plans for the Colburn House Complex and A.E.H.S., our Treasurer has filed with C.E.T.A. (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) an application for funding the Colburn House Project under Kennebec County Ceta, Title VI.

The object of this Project is to establish a valuable local historical-educational resource facility. The Ceta application requests and involves the assignment of Ceta workers to consolidate and document the information now scattered among our Society's members to establish a viable, exciting living history program for the Colburn House.

The filing of this application, a trial balloon, is an ambitious and sagacious attempt to expedite the restoration of the Colburn House and develop the programs of the long-range plans of our Society.

As narrated in Gilbert & Sullivan's Iolanthe, Act II - - - ''Nothing venture - Nothing win.' We will keep you informed of results.

CLEAN-UP DAY



Bob was born in Boston, February 24, 1925, son of Robert Alexander Cunningham and Esther Baldwin Cunningham. He attended Elementary, Junior High and High School in Newton, Mass, Class of '42. He topped off his higher education at Harvard College, Class of '46 and since graduation he has been continuously employed with the family business.

PASSING OF WARREN EDWARD COLBURN

Warren E. Colburn of Wakefield, Mass., died April 19th at the Melrose-Wakefield Hospital. He was born in Hallowell, Maine, July 22, 1913, the son of Edward Springer and Elsie Sawyer Colburn, Jr. He was an account executive for George H. Dean Co. of Boston and a Navy veteran of World War II. He was a graduate of the University of Rhode Island and Boston University.

Mr. Colburn was a member of A.E.H.S. since its inception and participated in the Reenactment of the Arnold Expedition in 1975. He was a sixth generation descendant of Reuben Colburn through Reuben's daughter Olive and her cousin John Colburn (son of Oliver), and maintained an interest in the Colburn House for years. He was buried at the Riverside Cemetery in Pittston where his great-grandparents, John Colburn and Susan Matthews Springer Colburn, are buried. He is survived by his wife, Mabelle Hersey Colburn, a daughter and two sons, and a brother.

The A.E.H.S. maintains a genealogical file on the Colburn descendants and Warren's record will be added to this file.

We lose a valued member of A.E.H.S. in his passing and hope that perhaps one of his heirs will carry on his interest in the Colburn House by joining our historical society.

MEMBERSHIP DUES


