The Colburn House will be decorated in Colonial style, and offer refreshments of a wassail bowl (non-alcoholic), cider, and hot cocoa. All kinds of home baked cookies and goodies will be available at modest prices. Pam Chase and her rug braiding group will demonstrate their art. There will be music - flute and a vocal quartet - carols, and a roaring fire in the fireplace.

Your admission donation will also admit you to the newly restored Old Colburn Schoolhouse, down the street. Decorated in Victorian style, it will feature a Christmas tree trimmed with ornaments hand made by local school children. Two school Christmas pageants will be presented, as well. Plenty of home baked goodies will be available here, so you had need not go hungry.


It comes packed in a flat blue box lined with suede-type paper, with a card describing its history in the lid.
